It is an unusual time and the Fan District Association Board continues to address the collective issues and needs of Fan residents. Recent meetings focused in four areas.

First, the Board is addressing core priorities as we all lead more sheltered lives. The Fan Newsletter is enhanced to provide frequent, full communications and we closely monitor a steady FDA budget. Unfortunately community grants are currently curtailed but will resume as FDA builds revenues through future neighborhood events.

Also, there is laser focus on collaboration with surrounding neighborhood groups during this period of social change. The FDA has taken a leadership role in convening conversations with fellow associations. We all look for constructive steps forward.

Third, FDA is working with neighborhood safety issues both through the introduction of a VCU covid 19 dashboard (https://together.vcu.edu) and partnership with our police precinct on consistent, accurate safety information.

Finally, the Board continues to explore avenues that engage residents in safe social activities like the City Council Mayoral Forum. We welcome resident ideas. Look for more detailed information about FDA work in both the Fan Newsletter and FanFare.

Holiday Recipe

Bourbon Pecan Pie

19" pie shell
2 cups pecans
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1 cup light Karo corn syrup
1/2 stick butter
3 eggs beaten
1/2 cup bourbon
1 teaspoon vanilla
Salt to taste
3/4 cup chocolate chips

Have left over pecans? Use them as decoration on top!

Preheat oven to 350 Degrees.

Heat up pie shell for about 5 minutes until crisp.

Toast pecans on a baking sheet for 5 minutes until fragrant.

In a saucepan, mix sugar, corn syrup, butter. Cook over medium heat stirring constantly until butter melts and sugar dissolves. Let it cool slightly.


In another bowl combine eggs, bourbon, vanilla and salt to taste. Slowly pour sugar mixture into egg mixture stirring constantly.




Car Club makes Special Delivery for Ronald McDonald House

Grants Spotlight

William Fox Elementary School

The FDA awarded the Fox Elementary PTA a grant for its annual Strawberry Street Festival, and even though the event had to be cancelled due to COVID-19, students still got to design a festival T-Shirt and raise money. A portion of the FDA grant was allocated to support virtual learning including teacher expense reimbursement and supplemental kindergarten programs.



The FDA's community grants program is funded through proceeds from the Holiday House Tour. The tour had to be scaled back this winter, leaving a potential budget shortfall for continuing the grants program. Higher Achievement

In the wake of COVID-19, achievement gaps are growing

faster. Research reported by The Washington Post suggests that this fall, most students will have fallen behind where they would have been if they had stayed in classrooms, with some losing the equivalent of a full school year's worth of academic gains. Support from the Fan District Association has allowed Higher Achievement to continue to provide critical virtual and in-person out-of-school support and mentoring to middle school students in Binford Middle School throughout the 2020-21 school year. The program's priority is to prepare scholars for both acceptance to and success in college track high schools and programs



FDA Working On The Pulse Corridor Rezoning

The FDA has been collaborating with associations representing the neighborhoods of Newtowne West, Carver and Jackson Ward, as well as the West Grace Street Association, Monument Avenue Preservation Society, and the Fan Area Business Alliance, because we all share the same questions and concerns about proposed rezoning on Broad Street between Belvidere and Arthur Ashe Boulevard. An umbrella organization, the RVA Coalition of Concerned Civic Associations, represents our seven associations.

We unanimously support greater density and growth in the Broad Street corridor, and would like to engage with the city and all stakeholders in fostering an active urban scene with pedestrian traffic on Broad Street throughout the day and evening. Washington, D.C., serves as a role model for what we can achieve here in Richmond: a city that preserves its scale and sense of place without high-rise towers upending the scale and context of two- and three- story historic neighborhoods.

The proposed high-rise business district rezoning would allow buildings over 20 stories tall. Such zoning violates the specific terms of the Pulse Corridor Plan, which was codified by City Council after several years of development with the neighborhoods: no buildings over 12 stories tall; extensive engagement with the neighborhoods in developing new zoning; and zoning that would be in scale and context with existing architecture.

In addition to the violations of the Plan, the Coalition has requested that our neighborhoods should and must be part of this process that will affect

all of Richmond for the next century and beyond. However, our written requests for engagement have gone unanswered.

We have also asked that the city abide by the Virginia Attorney General's recommendation to postpone all non-emergency decisions, including land use decisions, until the quarantine is over, for the obvious reason with which we are all familiar: it is impossible for the public to properly engage with a complicated rezoning issue of permanent consequence during a time in which we cannot meet and work together to achieve the best long-term outcomes for our city.

Quickness RVA Delivers

FanFare spotted a flier at Shield's Market that piqued our interest. Founded in 2010, eco-friendly Quickness RVA is a bike courier service offering both direct pick-up calls to any Richmond business on behalf of customers, and delivery for restaurants wanting to by-pass 3rd party delivery apps. Reached for comment, Quickness reports that while they experienced a dip in business at the beginning of COVID when partners closed, they're enjoying an up-tick as restaurants and diners look for local delivery options. Currently, they have a dozen bikers and two-dozen direct partners.

If ordering from their partner restaurants, delivery ranges from free (covered by the restaurant) to a few dollars. Rates for direct pick-up from non partner locations within the Fan are a flat \$5, with a generous boundary that extends from the James River to I-64, and Arthur Ashe Boulevard to Belvidere. The Whitmires Celebrate 25th Anniversary

Dr. Mark Whitmire and Virginia Whitmire came to St. James's Episcopal Church on West Franklin St. twenty-five years ago to lead the music program. Virginia was hired as organist and Choir Director, Mark as Director of Music and Choir Director, but it was an especially huge undertaking considering the church's sanctuary had recently been consumed by a fire. St. James's had always been known for its fine music, but the Whitmires immediately went to work expanding the program, especially concerning the involvement of children, youth, and young adults - the greatest priority for the Whitmires. They began a regular Children's Choir and Youth Choir, brought in several VCU music students to lead the Parish Choir, and expanded the 9:00 choir to allow a greater variety of music that might be more accessible to some parishioners.


After several years of gracious hosting by Temple Beth Ahabah next door, the parishioners of St. James's were able to return to their new sanctuary. The Whitmires gave thanks for the church's good fortune, in part, by adding several recital series, which have enabled the community



to share the beautiful sanctuary and organ. A cherub (preschool) choir was further added as well as many services dedicated to a musical genre (Jazz Mass, Bluegrass Mass, Dylan Mass, U2 Mass, among others).

The Whitmires, with their vast musical experience and

abilities, have enriched the lives of countless numbers of parishioners and neighbors all over the world. Mark and Virginia have taken the parish's choirs to England, France, Italy, New York City, and Washington, DC, and led or participated in mission trips to Haiti, Sudan, New Orleans and more. Many Fan residents, among thousands of others, will say that their lives have been touched forever by these two people. What a wonderful gift to have right in our backyard!


